
Revelry | William Pitts

I spent nearly all my upbringing in the town of Carrollton, Georgia, a close-knit community rich with historical charm. My development as both person and musician were positively influenced by the people, education, and experiences I was fortunate enough to encounter during my time there.

When I first visited Kingsport, Tennessee, I was immediately reminded of my hometown: southern charm, caring people, a major industrial icon, and a community that rallied around its citizens, businesses, and school system. I immediately felt at home with these folks, and it has been a great relationship ever since.

When Lafe Cook asked me to write a piece celebrating the centennial of Kingsport's founding, I was excited to celebrate a community spirit that was so familiar to me. *Revelry* is a celebratory fanfare that uses a nine-note theme as its core. The theme (pictured below) is a cryptogram of sorts, spelling out "K-I-N-G-S-P-O-R-T" using a 19th century French system (pictured below), in which the musical notes we know (A-G) are the basis for spelling out words using melodic lines. The version I created was transposed down a whole step to avoid me being fired for writing a band piece in G major...

Heart on Fire | Viet Cuong

This piece was commissioned by the Western and Northwestern Divisions of the College Band Directors National Association for the 2022 Bridgeworks Commissioning Project. It was premiered at the 2022 CBDNA Western/Northwestern Conference by the Puget Sound Wind Ensemble led by Gerard Morris.

Heart on Fire seeks to capture hope in the face of hardship and encourage us to live every day to the fullest. It is inspired by a line from Mary Oliver's poem, *Walking to Oak-Head Pond, and Thinking of the Ponds I Will Visit in the Next Days and Weeks:*

What is so utterly invisible as tomorrow? Not love, not the wind.

not the inside of a stone. Not anything. And yet, how often I'm fooled--I'm wading along

in the sunlight-and I'm sure I can see the fields and the ponds shining days ahead--I can see the light spilling

like a shower of meteors into next week's trees, and I plan to be there soon-and, so far, I am

just that lucky, my legs splashing over the edge of darkness, my heart on fire. I don't know where such certainty comes from-the brave flesh or the theater of the mind--

but if I had to guess I would say that only what the soul is supposed to be could send us forth

with such cheer as even the leaf must wear as it unfurls its fragrant body, and shines

against the hard possibility of stoppage-which, day after day, before such brisk, corpuscular belief, shudders, and gives way.

The Fairest of the Fair | John Philip Sousa

Perhaps one of Sousa's most melodic marches, *The Fairest of the Fair* was written for the Boston Food Fair in 1908. The Sousa Band was a regular musical staple of this event, and this march came about due to their amicable partnership with the Boston Retail Grocers' Association.

It is said the march takes inspiration from Sousa's impressions of a beautiful young lady employed at the previous years of the fair. In an interesting series of events, the march nearly missed its premiere due to oversight by the copyist and librarian. They frantically prepared the parts overnight while on the train to Boston and managed to save the band from a perhaps embarrassing fiasco.

Fairest of the Renaissance Faire | Erika Svanoe

Fairest of the Renaissance Faire is an inventive play on the melodies presented in Sousa's march — reimagined in the style of renaissance music with a focus on different instrumental families, or *consorts*. Music from the Renaissance period is among the earliest surviving for wind instruments, and several composers have adapted these pieces for modern bands. Svanoe draws specific inspiration from Tielman Susato and William Byrd in this pleasantly charming rendition.

The piece is in four short movements:

- 1. The Marche of King Jhon
- 2. Three Faire Maydens
- 3. A Birde's Swete Kiss
- 4. William's Wilde

Celebrations | John Zdechlik

Celebrations was commissioned by Earl C. Benson, conductor of the Medalist Concert Band of Bloomington, Minnesota. It was written to commemorate the twentieth anniversary of the Medalist Concert Band.

The work is very spirited and consists of two themes. The first is very fluid and is stated by the woodwinds. The brass and percussion add punctuation to this theme. The second theme (while maintaining the same tempo) is very sostenuto and lyric in sound.

La Fiera Asturiana | Michele Fernandez

In my mid 20's (30+ yrs ago while still a new high school band teacher), I promised my father, Jorge, that I would someday write a piece for his mother who succumbed to cancer at age 34 (when he was only 6 years old). Our grandmother, Armanda Martínez Pajares, was a Flamenco dancer in Asturias, Spain, and mother to 3 young children. She had a generous, loving, yet fiery personality, and struggled quite valiantly to stay. The whole family traveled from Spain to Cuba to secure her surgery with a renowned specialist, even with bare financial means...

After finally retiring and devoting all my professional efforts to composing, I decided it was finally time to keep that promise and share part of our family's story of devotion and resilience through a passionate ³/₄ Spanish March with a Flamenco flavor and a Paso Doble spirit...I hope this work can bring joy to both players and audiences, and especially our students. In that way, a grandmother I never met, and who did not get the chance to stay and raise her own children- might still be able to contribute smiles to someone else's kids. *It's never too late to keep your word.*

One of the most popular 20th-century British composers, Gerald Finzi is particularly known for his marvelous works for voice. Influenced by Elgar and Vaughan Williams, his musical style is captivating and distinctive, and adapts beautifully in instrumental settings.
