

This season of early music celebrates Europe's rich musical landscape with three vibrant programs steeped in the history and creativity that defined eras: The dramatic flair of the Neapolitan Baroque, bold reimaginings of Bach, and the majestic resonance of brass echoing the sounds of Venice's St. Mark's Basilica. Each concert offers a fresh perspective on the expressive power and diverse beauty of early music.



L'Invenzione In the Shadow of Vesuvius

Experience the vibrant musical world of 17th- and 18th-century Naples with L'Invenzione in a program that captures the drama and brilliance of the Neapolitan Baroque. Considered the musical capital of Europe at that time, Naples was a thriving hub of creativity where composers flourished under the ever-present gaze of Mount Vesuvius. This concert features recorder concertos and trio sonatas for strings by Alessandro Scarlatti and his contemporaries, offering an evocative journey into a world of dramatic musical contrasts that mirror the geographical and geopolitical backdrop of Naples itself.

Emi Ferguson and Ruckus *Fly the Coop*

The program features new arrangements of Bach's Flute Sonatas and Keyboard Preludes, orchestrated for baroque flute and the forces of Ruckus that include a vibrant mix of theorbos, baroque guitars, baroque bassoon, cello, viola da gamba, harpsichord, organ, bass, and the occasional banjo.

The Sounds of St. Mark's

Named for the iconic bronze horses atop Venice's St. Mark's Basilica, the Dark Horse Consort brings to life the glorious brass traditions of the late Renaissance and early Baroque. This acclaimed ensemble recreates the inspiring musical atmosphere of 16th- and 17th-century Europe with a program of majestic canzoni for multiple choirs by Giovanni Gabrieli and Giovanni Picchi, alongside stunningly virtuosic sonatas by Dario Castello. Inspired by the rapturous kaleidoscope of sound for which St. Mark's was famous, this concert evokes the splendor and innovation of sacred music-making in churches of the time.

The MSU Symphony Orchestra offers seven major performances, including a holiday collaboration with choral ensembles, while the MSU Concert Orchestra adds four more thematic concerts. The season spans classical masterworks to contemporary pieces, including the "Fanfare" performance series highlighting premieres by emerging MSU composers.






