ARTIST-FACULTY BIOS

Corbin Wagner received his Bachelor Degree in 1979 from the University of Michigan. Prior to graduation, he became a member of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra. He later received his Master Degree from U of M in 1989. Prior to his appointment at Michigan State University, he served as adjunct horn professor at Oakland University, the University of Michigan, and Wayne State University. He also served at the Interlochen Arts Academy Summer Intensive from 2014-2023.

After his appointment as Associate Professor of Horn, Wagner retired from the Detroit Symphony Orchestra after 35 years and retired from the Detroit Chamber Winds of over 30 years of service.

Wagner has received many prestigious performing honors, including a third prize at the 1983 ADR, the Munich International Horn Competition. He also took first prize at the American International Horn Competition in hand horn, valve horn, and horn quartet. He has released two CDs featuring new works for horn, soprano, and piano. He currently performs in the Lansing Symphony Orchestra, the Peninsula Music Festival in Door County, WI., and the Traverse City Symphony Orchestra.

Patrick Johnson is Assistant Professor of Music Theory at the MSU College of Music. He teaches undergraduate courses in music theory and piano literature, as well as graduate courses in form. counterpoint, and analysis of film music. He strives to engage his students both artistically and intellectually by connecting music theory to their work as performers, composers, and educators. In 2018, he received the Dortha J. and John D. Withrow Award for Excellence in Teaching from the MSU College of Music. His research interests include music theory pedagogy, and he contributed a chapter to the recent Routledge Companion to Music Theory Pedagogy. Johnson is an active performer on piano, organ, and harpsichord. An avid orchestral musician, he is principal pianist for the Lansing Symphony Orchestra, the Jackson Symphony Orchestra, and the Michigan Philharmonic. He served as organist and music director for parishes within the Archdiocese of Detroit for 16 years. Johnson received his Bachelor degree in piano performance from the University of Michigan, where he also studied organ electively. He holds a Master of Music in music theory, and both an MM and a Doctor of Musical Arts in piano performance from Michigan State University.

ARTIST-FACULTY BIOS

I-Fu Wang, associate professor of violin at the MSU College of Music, is a former member of the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra and the Detroit Symphony Orchestra. As a chamber musician, he has performed regularly with Music From Marlboro, the Kennedy Center Theater Chamber Players, the Fontana Festival of Music and Art, and as a guest artist with various chamber music series throughout the nation. For many years, Wang was the music director of the Renaud Chamber Orchestra and concertmaster of the Lansing Symphony Orchestra. His violin students can be found in major orchestras and/or teaching in universities here and abroad. Wang attended the Curtis Institute. His former teachers include Ivan Galamian, Paul Makanowitzky, Jaime Laredo, and Felix Galimir.
